Reviewed by Pamela C. McDuff. In the autumn of 1993, soon after his move to Bologna, Antonio Tabucchi began to work on his novel *Sostiene Pereira*. His interest in it had been aroused by the presence of an almost identical novella in the collection of short stories , published by Feltrinelli in 1994. The published version, in a rather garbled and damaged state, had been compiled and edited by Roberto Torti, who was unaware of the presence of the prior story. This novella, translated into English as "Hold on to Your Fur," is based on the life of an Italian journalist, Paolo Rovini, and, like *Sostiene Pereira*, is written in the first person. Rovini is the protagonist of the book, a man who suffered a series of debilitating illnesses and has become a kind of

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hermit. It was Rovini who, after a discussion with the short-story writer, gradually begins to articulate his own voice, a voice that takes on a more forceful and at times violent aspect. When Rovini dies, the journalist's biography becomes a celebration of life. Rovini, who suffers from both illness and remorse, dies in the hospital, surrounded by friends and family. The perequeria (conversation) is the work's final episode. Antonio Tabucchi's *Sostiene Pereira* is thus an homage to the first of two literary and artistic models that are in some ways interchangeable: Borges's "The Aleph." In a radio interview with Giovanni Minervini, the Italian writer, Tabucchi explains that he has always felt "the need to go into the labyrinth."
