2. How to Paint a Wall Like a Pro

Getting ready to paint your walls? Hint: A properly primed surface makes all the difference.

Painting the walls in your home is one of those DIY projects that most homeowners can tackle, and it'll cost far less than hiring pros to do it. Plus, there are so many great paint brand options to choose from, giving your walls a refresh is easy. But you'll want to study up a bit before you take on this project. Using proper painting techniques—and the right painting tools—will give you a professional finish.

You'll see that our steps start with getting the wall ready. It may be tempting to skip ahead to the painting part, but prepping the wall appropriately is essential for getting professional-looking results. So gather your supplies...it's time to make your wall look brand new!

Instructions

How to Paint a Wall

Choose Your Color

Looking at swatches in store is fun, but to figure out what will look best in your space, you'll want to take home a sample can. Paint a little area on your wall or walls and take note of what it looks like during the day vs. at night and in a dark corner vs. near a window. You'll want to make sure you love it as much at 10:00 AM as you do at 3:00 PM! Some companies, like Clare, can send you peel-and-stick vinyl swatches to test with, which means you don't have to paint your walls at all. Win! Once you've chosen your color, make sure you buy enough. The general rule of thumb is one gallon per 350-400 square feet.



Clean the Walls

- Use a broom to clear out hard-to-reach dust and cobwebs in the corners of the ceiling.
- Vacuum baseboards and window sills with a hand-held vacuum or bristle attachment. Then run a wet cloth over these areas.
- Using a large cellulose sponge and a solution of water mixed with a few drops of mild dishwashing liquid, clean the walls to remove any dust, dirt, and grease.
- Wipe down the walls with a damp cloth to remove soap residue.

Tape the Trim

Use blue painter's tape (not masking tape) to protect areas you don't want your paint to get on, such as trim, molding, doorknobs, window frames, and door frames. Run long strips of tape just inside the outer edges of these areas. (The outer edges of the tape should lie exactly where the wall meets the trim, covering the parts of the trim that your roller or paintbrush might hit when you paint.)

Pour Primer in a Tray

- If you're using tarps for the floor, set them out now.
- Line the paint tray with a plastic liner or tin foil to make cleanup easier later.
- Pour in enough paint so that it almost fills the well toward the bottom of the tray without covering the angled portion of the tray where the ridges are.

Brush the Corners

- Start with the corners—the areas the roller won't reach. Using a 2-inch angled paintbrush, dip the bristles into the paint about a third of the way. Gently slap the insides of the can to remove excess paint.

- Brush on paint around the trim and in the corners of the walls with the brush. Extend out 2 to 3 inches from windows, doors, and moldings.

Roll the Primer Onto the Wall

- Dip your roller into the primer paint, rolling it back and forth across the tray's ridges a few times to remove any excess and prevent drips. Make sure the roller gets evenly coated.
- Run the roller up and down a section of the wall, applying primer until the section is fully covered. Continue until your wall is fully covered, reapplying primer to the roller as needed.
- Follow the manufacturer's drying instructions, which you'll find on the can, to make sure the primer is completely dry before applying paint.

Roll on Paint in a "W" Shape

- Fill a paint tray with paint and dip your roller into it, removing the excess.
- Roll the paint onto the wall in a 3-by-3-foot "W" shape. Working your way back across that "w" without lifting the roller, fill in empty patches until that section of wall is fully covered.
- Continue, adding more paint to the roller as needed, until the whole wall is painted.
- Consider using an extension pole (one of the common techniques used by pro painters), even on the walls, to make it easier to refill your paint roller and cover your wall more quickly.

Remove the Painter's Tape

Peel off the tape while the paint is still wet (ideally about an hour after you've finished painting) to avoid accidentally removing any dried paint along with it. Leaving the painter's tape on too long is one of the most common painting mistakes people make.

Know When Your Paint Is Dry

Different kinds of paint dry at different speeds—and they'll feel dry to the touch before they're ready for you to lay on an extra coat. A latex-based paint will feel dry to the touch in about an hour, and be ready for a second coat in four hours. An oil-based paint takes six hours to feel dry, and you should wait a day to apply a second coat.

Change The Scene With Mirrors

Floor-length mirrors reflect light into your space and also make any room feel bigger by creating the illusion of depth. Go for a curvy shape, which adds a visual pop and contrasts against the straight lines of furniture and other pieces in your surroundings.

6. How To Remove Oil Spots From Walls

Walls are boundaries of protection that create a cosy space called home. They are the overly visible part of a property and grab attention instantly. Thus, they are painted in vibrant colours and adorned with beautiful add-ons to match with the decor. Since these create divisions across the residential space, they are subjected to wear and tear. While chipped paint is easily restored with a new coat, stains on recently painted walls can be heart-wrenching.

Oil spots on walls are common in the kitchen and sometimes in other rooms when you forget to wipe your hands before touching the walls and doors. These stains create greasy blemishes that ruin the look of the rooms and affect the overall appeal of the house. Since they attract attention immediately, these marks must be cleaned immediately for a clean and hygienic home. Here is how to remove oil spots from walls. These tips ensure effective cleaning without smudging or damaging the paint.

1. Cleaning Oil Stains on Kitchen Walls

Deep-frying fish and chicken or sautéing vegetables leads to oil evaporation from the pans in the form of droplets. These oil droplets settle on the walls and kitchen cabinets surrounding the stovetop and create spots that impact cleanliness. Splattering of gravy and oil while cooking can also cause the same problem, which makes the walls look dirty and unkempt.

It is essential to spring into action immediately and blot the stain with a paper towel to soak up the oil. The next step is to add a few drops of dishwashing liquid soap to water and dip a clean cloth in it. Now, use the cloth to wipe the stain by moving it over the area in circular motions. Do not put too much pressure on the wall, and scrub it gently to prevent damaging the expensive paint.

2. Use Vinegar to Wipe the Greasy Spots

White vinegar, also known as distilled vinegar, is commonly used in cooking and making sauces and pickles. It has a neutral taste and can contain 4% to 20% acetic acid, depending on its type. It is the

perfect cleaning agent for homes because it does not contain harmful chemicals present in store-bought commercial cleaners.



Thus, tenants hire professional end of lease cleaners Melbourne to maintain optimum hygiene when vacating the rented property. To clean oil stains from walls, white vinegar must be mixed with water in equal parts. The solution should be sprayed on the spot and allowed to stay for a few minutes. Finally, it should be wiped with a clean rag for spot-free walls.

3. Try Baking Soda For Wall Cleaning

Baking soda is in every baking enthusiast's pantry. The alkaline powder is made from a naturally occurring mineral called sodium carbonate or soda ash. It is a natural cleaner that simplifies cleaning tasks. Since it is non-abrasive in nature, it can be used on painted walls without any risk of defacement.

To clean the oily stains, homeowners must mix three tablespoons of baking soda with warm water to create a cleaning paste. The paste should be applied to the oil spots on the walls, and the area should be scrubbed gently to remove the stains. Finally, the wall must be cleaned with a damp rag to remove residue.

4. Opt for the Toothpaste Cleaning Hack

While toothpastes are used for cleaning teeth, they can also be used to remove oil spots from the walls. It is essential to use white toothpaste for this hack, or it can lead to deeper staining. Begin the process by blotting oil from the surface with a paper towel. Next, apply white toothpaste to the spot and let it dwell for a few minutes. Finally, wipe the wall with a damp cloth and remove all the toothpaste to get a clean wall.

5. Try Shaving Cream for Removing Wall Stains

Shaving cream is easily available in every household and can be used to maintain the beauty of the walls if oil spots have impacted them. These gentle cleaners are meant for the skin and do not drip, so they can be easily used on the walls. Apply the cream on the stain and let it dwell for a few minutes before wiping it with a clean, wet cloth or cotton. It helps to avoid using chemicals that can harm the paint and the environment. Many non-toxic household items can be used as a vital tool for end of lease cleaning in Melbourne for green cleaning.

6. Use A Magic Eraser for Tough Oily Stains

Magic Erasers can be used on light-coloured walls to remove oil spots. These are usually used to remove scuff marks but can also be used for oily and greasy stains. However, it is essential to do a spot-test in an inconspicuous part to ensure it does not harm the paint. Most end of lease cleaners in Melbourne do this test to ensure zero damage.

For wall cleaning, the Magic Eraser should be dipped in warm water and squeezed thoroughly to remove all the excess water. It should then be moved gently over the stains in circular motions, with the white part of the sponge facing the wall. Renters can use this method to ensure the maintenance of the property.

Walls are highly noticeable and cannot be hidden behind curtains or frames. They should be neat and free from all types of marks. Follow the steps above to remove oil spots from the walls and make them look flawless.
